# **About the Sutton Music Festival online entry system:**

We have teamed up with "Run My Festival" to make festival entry more manageable for entrants, teachers and parents. The system has been widely adopted by festivals, and provides a secure online entry and payment system. Payment can be made using PayPal (which gives access to credit cards), bank transfer BACS or by cheque. We would like all entries to be online, but for this year we are also providing our usual paper entry forms. Please note PayPal can only be used for online entry. Please follow the guidance on our website.

# **FESTIVAL ACCOMPANISTS**

Our Official Festival Accompanists can be arranged for Instrumental and Vocal sections but need to be requested and paid for at the time of entry. Accompanist fees are banded by a letter suffixed to the Entry fees for each class in this syllabus. A copy of music must be sent to them directly **at least 14 days** before the festival begins.

If the accompanist does not receive the music in advance, he/she reserves the right to refuse to play.

All additional rehearsals MUST be arranged directly with the relevant accompanist.



## About our Adjudicators......

Robert Bailey, AGSM, LRAM - General Instrumental and Strings - is a 'cellist, pianist and conductor. He attended the Guildhall School of Music and Drama and has enjoyed a varied career, holding principal 'cello positions at English National Opera, the Royal Philharmonic Pops Orchestra and the Academy of London. He was for five years 'cellist in the Delme String Quartet, with whom he toured all over Europe, made several CDs, and broadcast frequently on BBC Radio 3. He has also conducted orchestras both in London and in Australia. In the field of education Robert teaches 'cello and piano and has worked at the Royal College of Music and The Guildhall School of Music as an orchestral and chamber music coach. He taught for several years at London's Centre for Young Musicians where he was conductor of both the Symphony Orchestra and the String Chamber Orchestra. He is also much in demand as a festival adjudicator all over the UK.

Julia Dewhurst, FTCL, ARCM, PGCA, CertEd, FRSA, FISM - Vocal - has appeared as a lyric-coloratura soprano on the national and international concert and opera stage in an ongoing performing career spanning over 30 years. Her repertoire is wide-ranging, from Early Music to first performances of contemporary works. Julia has extensive and relevant teaching experience across the entire age-range. She was for many years a visiting singing specialist in a London primary school, also leading voice care workshops for teachers. A popular and much sought-after vocal adjudicator for the British and International Federation of Festivals for some 18 years, she is also currently a Music Deputy on the Adjudicators' Council. Julia is a member of the Incorporated Society of Musicians, the Association of Teachers of Singing, the British Voice Association, the Association of English Singers and Speakers for whom she has judged both the Patricia Routledge Competition and the Courtney Kenny Prize and she is a Friend of the Society of the Teachers of the Alexander Technique.

Eva Doroszkowska, BMus, PGDipRNCM, PGDipAmsterdam - Piano - is an international pianist whose dramatic and colourful interpretations have earned her high acclaim. She won a scholarship to study at the Royal Northern College of Music and with further scholarships continued her studies with Professor Jasinski at the Katowice Szymanowski Academy in Poland. She also took postgraduate solo diplomas in Amsterdam and Copenhagen. Eva's performing schedule has included appearances on BBC and Polish television and radio. She worked with the late Gorecki and Per Norgard and has collaborated with various chamber ensembles from string quartet to jazz and pop. Alongside her performing Eva enjoys a busy and varied life as a teacher, accompanist and festival adjudicator. She has taught at the Royal Academy Junior Department since 2001 and has also written for International Piano Magazine.

David Fonville, AGSM, DipEd(Adv), PGCA, MCIPR, MSTSD, HonFIMSSS - Speech and Drama - is a teacher, examiner and adjudicator of speech and drama, communications, musical theatre and English. After working initially in schools, he became an Independent Radio News Editor and BBC Radio Education Producer, devising the series "Christmas in a Country House". David has several times been elected a Council member of the Society of Teachers of Speech and Drama and is currently Chairman of its adjudicators' selection panel. He has also examined for the Guildhall School of Music and Drama and Trinity College London and was for many years Chairman of Kettering and District Eisteddfod and of the Governors of Kingsthorpe College. David has made a significant contribution to the British and International Federation of Festivals, for which he has been honoured with an Adjudicator Fellowship. He has been a Board member, served many terms on its Adjudicators' Council and as AC Chairman and also works as an adjudicator assessor.

Neil Jenkins, MACantab - Choral - joined his first choir at the age of 7, later becoming a Chorister at Westminster Abbey and a Choral Scholar at King's College Cambridge. Whilst there, he sang in 'The Kings Singers' and in the first concerts given by the Monteverdi Choir. He is now an internationally renowned tenor, conductor and music editor and has recorded over 60 discs of opera, oratorio and song with many of the world's leading conductors. In the 1970s he was appointed an RCM singing professor by Sir David Willcocks, and became a regular soloist with the Bach Choir, especially in the Bach Passions. Neil combines his singing career with an increasingly important role as a musicologist. He has translated and edited Bach's major choral works for the New Novello Choral Edition, and has produced editions for OUP & Barn End Press. He gives a regular series of master classes, is a well-known music festival adjudicator and sits on international singing juries.

Gillian Johnston, AGSM - Winds - is a graduate of the Guildhall School of Music and Drama. After a period of freelance playing as a bassoonist, she turned her attention to teaching, firstly building up the instrumental department at Stratford House School in Bromley before moving to Harpenden where, with her husband David, she established her own music school, 'Harpenden Musicale'. As well as running the music school, Gill arranges Musicale Holidays, Competitions and a Summer Music Festival. She is co-founder of the National Children's Wind and Chamber Orchestras, running their Easter courses, followed by concerts at home and abroad. Gill is passionately interested in encouraging children to 'make music' and thoroughly enjoys adjudicating at festivals all over the country.

# FESTIVAL RULES - PLEASE READ CAREFULLY

### 1 ELIGIBILITY

Except where otherwise indicated (e.g. that a class is OPEN) only AMATEURS and not professionals may enter the competitions.

A Professional is defined as one who derives, or has derived, the major part of his or her living from performing or teaching the instrument or voice concerned. Open classes, shown in each section of the syllabus, are open to all candidates whether professional or amateur.

No competitor may take part more than once in the same class, except on a different instrument, or in duet or ensemble classes where a different piece must be performed with a different partner.

### 2 AGE LIMITS

Where age limits apply they will be strictly adhered to; such age to be reckoned as at **SEPTEMBER 1st** preceding the Festival. Proof of age must be provided if requested.

### 3 ENTRIES, ENTRY FEES AND ADMISSION CHARGES

Entries to be made online by following a link from our website **www.suttonmusicfestival.org.uk** or by sending the paper entry form to the relevant section secretaries by post. Fees are not returnable.

The Committee reserves the right to refuse entry.

Please note that the entry fee for Choirs includes a sum of £25.00 that will be refunded after the event provided the choir has performed in the Festival

# LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. NO SWITCHING OF CLASSES OR CHANGES TO THE PUBLISHED TIMETABLE WILL BE PERMITTED.

The Festival reserves the right to alter the class performance order on the day.

A daily Admission Charge (with concessions) will be made for ALL non-performers attending on each day of the competitions.

### 4 MARKING

Marks will be awarded in <u>ALL</u> sections and entrants placed in one of **SIX** categories as an indication of their achievement.

Certificates will be awarded for each category.

### 5 AWARDS

**Trophies and Prizes** will be awarded at the discretion of the adjudicator and only where a **minimum mark of 87** (Category of Distinction) has been achieved.

In classes where a **minimum mark of 87** (Category of Distinction) has been achieved **medals** will be awarded as follows:-

- A First Prize gold coloured medal will be awarded to the first placed
  performer, provided that a minimum mark of 87 (Distinction) has been
  achieved, with a Second Prize silver coloured medal awarded to the
  second placed performer, providing there are FOUR or more performers in
  the class and a minimum mark of 84 (Very Good) has been achieved.
- In classes with three or fewer performers, a second prize medal will not be awarded unless warranted by exceptional circumstances.
- Split classes will carry separate medal awards but only one overall trophy, where relevant.

The Piano Bursary may not be won by the same competitor in two consecutive years. Where by reason of this ruling the top qualifier is barred from competing in the final bursary class, the next to qualify in the class will compete instead, provided their total marks are 170 or over in the two classes involved.

### 6 MUSIC

Editions: The prescribed editions of music and key, where specified, must be used. Repeats: No repeats (apart from *Da Capo*) are to be performed unless specified. Accompaniment: If a selected piece has been composed and published with an accompaniment, it must be performed with that accompaniment in order to qualify for adjudication. No recorded accompaniments are permitted.

Own Choice: Title, composer and performance time must be stated on the entry form at the time of entry. Only notated items may be offered unless otherwise specified in Jazz/Improvisation classes. Set pieces in this syllabus may not be offered in Own Choice classes, and no item may be included in more than one class. Any change of piece must be notified to the relevant Section Secretary before the Festival begins. The adjudicator will take into consideration the artistic merit of self-chosen pieces, i.e. whether the standard of music etc. is worthy of the class in which it is to be performed. Where the chosen piece fails to meet the designated criteria for a particular class, the competitor will not be considered for a place amongst the winners and their mark/category may be withheld. In all cases of Own Choice, a copy of the piece selected must be provided for the adjudicator at the time of competing. Please do not send music to the Section Secretary unless requested.

### 7 PERFORMING RIGHTS

This Festival has entered into an agreement with the Authors' Licensing and Collection Society. This means that entrants do not have to seek copyright permission for any poetry, prose or solo dramatic items performed to a time limit of 10 minutes. Performers and teachers should know that this will ensure authors are directly reimbursed as a consequence of their works being performed. Duologues and group dramatic activities are not covered by this agreement and copyright for these items must be sought by performers at the time of entry. Solo dramatic items must be announced with title and author at the time of performance to qualify for copyright indemnity and the performer must not change the words or gender of the character.

### 8 PHOTOCOPIES

Photocopies will **not** be accepted except in the following circumstances: when an Own Choice work is selected from a publication containing several different works and which is not available separately, one copy may be made for the use of the adjudicator provided that the performer has already purchased his/her copy. This copy will be retained and destroyed by the Festival immediately after the event.

This permission specifically does not apply to set pieces, nor for making copies for the use of performers or accompanists, all of whom should always have a printed copy.

It is the performer's responsibility to observe these rules.

### 9 TIME LIMITS

These, where set, will be strictly adhered to. A bell will be rung on expiry of the allotted time and competitors who over-run will be stopped. They will not be considered for a place amongst the winners and their mark/category may be withheld.

It is not acceptable to offer only part of a movement or piece.

### 10 TIME OF COMPETITION

Notice of the time of competition will be sent to every competitor at least one week before the Festival. If by then no notice has been received, an immediate enquiry should be sent to the relevant Section Secretary. Alternatively telephone the Festival helpline 07706 100856

### 11 PRIZEWINNERS' CONCERT

On the recommendation of the adjudicators, selected Prizewinners will be invited to perform in the Prizewinners' Concert. They will be notified in writing after the completion of the competitions in each Section.

**Cups and Trophies** will normally be presented from the platform at the Prizewinners' Concert. They cannot be sent through the post or by courier services, if the recipient is unable to collect them at the Concert.

CUPS AND TROPHIES AWARDED IN 2019 WILL BE HELD FOR 11 MONTHS ONLY. THEY SHOULD BE RETURNED IN PERSON IN THEIR BOXES AND IN A PROPERLY CLEANED CONDITION ON OR BEFORE 15th OCTOBER 2020.

12 COMPLAINTS should be made <u>in writing</u> to the Chairman within seven days of the end of the Festival.

### 13 SAFEGUARDING



# **Sutton Music Festival 2019 - Child Protection Policy**

Delivered in partnership with



The British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech work for amateur festivals everywhere to help create thousands of educational performance opportunities for children and young people each year.

The Federation, and our member Festivals, are committed to ensuring safe environments for children and young people and believe that it is always unacceptable for a child or young person to experience abuse of any kind. We recognise our responsibility to safeguard the welfare of all children and young people, by a commitment to recommend best practice which protects them.

This policy applies to our Board of Trustees, paid staff, Adjudicator members, volunteers, students or anyone working on behalf of the Federation and our member Festivals.

### We recognise that:

- the welfare of the child/young person is paramount
- all children, regardless of age, disability, gender, racial heritage, religious belief, sexual orientation or identity, have the right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- working in partnership with children, young people, their parents, carers and other agencies is essential in promoting young people's welfare

### The purpose of the policy:

- to provide protection for the children and young people who participate in our festivals, including the children of festival members
- to provide staff and volunteers with guidance on procedures they should adopt in the event that they suspect a child or young person may be experiencing, or be at risk of, harm

### We will seek to safeguard children and young people by:

- valuing them, listening to and respecting them
- adopting child protection guidelines through procedures and safe working practice for staff and volunteers
- recruiting staff and volunteers safely, ensuring all necessary checks are made
- sharing information about child protection and safe working practice with children, parents, staff and volunteers
- sharing information about concerns with agencies who need to know, and involving parents and children appropriately
- providing effective management for staff and volunteers through supervision, support and training

The Federation will review this policy each year in November in line with Safe Network guidance or sooner in light of any changes in legislation or guidance. All changes will be communicated to our member Festivals in time for the start of the new Festival year.

## **Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone**

The Federation and its member Festivals use the following policies and procedures to create **Safer Festivals** for everyone:

- 1. A single, definitive Child Protection Policy adopted by all Federation Festivals.
- 2. One or more designated Festival Safeguarding Officers (FSO) appointed for each Federation Festival. The Sutton Music Festival Safeguarding Officer is **Mr Alan Caddick**.
- 3. Best practice advice in the form of **Safe Working Practice** and **Festival Child Protection leaflets**, with support and training for all Festival staff and volunteers. Including clear reporting procedures for anyone with a concern about a child.
- 4. Appropriate recruitment and induction procedures for all new Festival staff and volunteers responsible for providing safe environments for everyone attending / performing at a Federation Festival.
- 5. All Festival volunteers wear a Festival badge and may be approached with any problem. All teachers/parents/ guardians/carers are asked to report all incidents of any nature to anyone wearing a badge. All reported incidents will be handled in accordance with the **Safe Working Practice** and **Festival Child Protection** best practice advice. In addition we will ensure the availability of a quiet area / room where concerns can be expressed in private.
- 6. **For the duration of a Festival all teachers/parents/guardians/carers are responsible for the continuous care and supervision of their own children/pupils.** If they are unable to attend personally, they must delegate their responsibilities to an identified adult and ensure that their children/pupils are aware of the identity and name of the person responsible for their care. This includes supervision throughout all Festival venues, practice and changing rooms that may be provided. The Festival cannot take responsibility for any property left unattended.
- 7. No unauthorised photography, audio or video recording of children and young people is allowed in the performance areas at our Festivals. Where parents/guardians/carers do not wish photos to be taken at all, then the responsible adult attending should ensure that their child is not included in official photos.
- 8. Some children and vulnerable adults may have specific needs in order to take part. If this is the case we ask the responsible teachers/parents/guardians/carers to contact the Festival organisers prior to arrival. The Festival actively seeks wherever possible to meet these needs, but must know beforehand in order to prepare support or to advise that help cannot be provided on this occasion.
- 9. The Festival's Child Protection Policy and approach to Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone is published explicitly in our Syllabus, Programme and on our website. By completing and signing the entry form all parents / guardians / carers and teachers of competitors under 18 (or vulnerable adults of any age) confirm that they give (or have obtained) the necessary consents for the competitors to take part in the Festival. Without consent the entry to the Festival cannot be accepted.
